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FROM THE DESK OF RABBI PEARL

The month of January contains, on January 28th, the holiday of Tu B'Shvat, popularly called "New Year for the Trees". What does that mean?

On the Chabad website, we find the following explanation:

The 15th of Shevat on the Jewish calendar celebrated this year on Thursday, January 28, 2021—is the day that marks the beginning of a "new year" for trees. Commonly known as Tu Bishvat, this day marks the season in which the earliest-blooming trees in the Land of Israel emerge from their winter sleep and begin a new fruit-bearing cycle. We mark the 15th of Shevat by eating fruit, particularly from the kinds that are singled out by the Torah in its praise of the bounty of the Holy Land: grapes, figs, pomegranates, olives and dates. On this day we remember that "man is a tree of the field" (Deuteronomy 20:19), and reflect on the lessons we can derive from our botanical analogue. As is the case with many Torah laws, the halachah is based on what happens in the Land of Israel. So, since most of Israel's rainy season is over by the 15th of Shevat, this date is New considered the Year for Trees. Rabbi Shlomo Yitzchaki (Rashi) explains that at this point the ground has become saturated with the rains of the new year, causing the sap to start rising in the trees, which means that the fruit can begin to bud. The Jerusalem Talmud records alternative explanation. Until the New Year for Trees, all trees can

survive on the water from the previous year. After their New Year, the trees derive their life source from the water of the New Year.

So in the midst of winter, when trees and all other

So in the midst of winter, when trees and all other vegetation look dead, we recognize that appearances can be deceptive. Underneath the surface, the regeneration of life, which in the case of trees is the generation and rising of sap, is taking place. No matter

how bleak the day seems, life is reviving and gaining strength for the future.

In this time of COVID 19, when so much of our economic, political and social landscape seems bleak, when social distancing and quarantines have isolated us, when we all despair of life returning to "normal", the image of Tu B'Shvat is powerful for us. Under the surface in this year of virus and despair, hope, healing and renewal are rising. With the availability of life saving vaccines growing day by day, we can all look forward to the day when we can socialize, shop, pray and play with safety. Tu B'Shvat teaches us to hold on in the most difficult of times for, like the spring, they will end, and renewal and rebirth will come.

Stay safe and celebrate this beautiful day on our calendar.

On December 14, we had our Book Club meeting. The selection was "The Storyteller," by Jodi Piccoult, a multigenerational story focusing on the Holocaust.


